Your update from Oregon... baby swans... far flung travels!



Thanks to you, three cygnets that hatched this summer at Sunriver Nature Center will soon be heading to the Zoo Idaho winter home you made possible.

The cygnets hatched in late June to "Val and Gus" our Sunriver Nature Center breeding pair.

These young swans will be released into the Oregon wild in 2024!

This winter the young swans will have minimal human contact on the remote Zoo Idaho 3.5 acre wetland. This prepares them for life in the wild.

They will join their sibling that hatched last summer that already arrived at this new winter home. All these swans will be released into the wild thanks to you!

Thank you for tracking swans that received GPS/GSM tracking collars this winter at Oregon's Summer Lake Wildlife Area. Green and orange markers show where 4 swans with GPS/GSM collars are as of September 13, 2023. Most swans with GPS collars are in Alberta.

However, one swan, female @13 is in northern British Columbia, near Yukon and Northwest Territories. (red arrow, above)

Right: Female swan @13 is at Maxhamish Lake Provincial Park and Protected Area. This is a 67,990-acre provincial park in British Columbia, Canada.



Thanks to you, recent movements of female swan @13 in British Columbia are being tracked.

You are bringing swans to Oregon - a new family!

Five years ago, the Trumpeter Swan Society purchased two swans for the Oregon Restoration Project. The captive swan pair has been at Juniper Preserve/Pronghorn Club and Resort in Bend, Oregon. The pair successfully nested this spring and hatched their first brood! The surviving cygnets will be released into the Oregon wild in 2024 as yearlings. Thank you for your support of the Oregon Restoration Project.

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An interview with David Freitag, Director of Agronomy, Juniper Preserve, Bend, Oregon

Tell me about Juniper Preserve which is home to this trumpeter swan pair

Juniper Preserve is one square mile, or 640 acres. The community contains a resort with two golf courses (Pronghorn Club). We have over 100 existing homes with about 1/2 being year-round residents.

Where do the swans live?

The swans stay on Fazio Lake which has a surface size of two acres. The lake contains 12-15 million gallons of water and is up to 15 feet deep. The swans nest on the island which gives them some security from predators.

What do the residents and visitors think about the swan pair?

The swan pair has always been very popular with a lot of interest within the community and from visitors.

What do they think about the cygnets that hatched this summer?

The cygnets have made the swans even more popular. A lot of residents and guests alike love seeing the swan family and hearing the story of what the program is trying to accomplish. People have definitely taken a vested interest in learning more and protecting the cygnets and parents.

What are the challenges for you and the swan family with this first brood?

The biggest challenge with the first brood has been almost too much attention. Most people are very interested and want to get a closer look.

The parents (Olivia Newton Swan and Swan Travolta) are obviously very protective of their cygnets (Elton Swan and Obi-Swan Kenobi). Signage, education, and monitoring have been ramped up given the extra

attention. Their home (Event Island) is an event space and there have been some weddings on the island. The swans, especially the swan dad Swan Travolta, were very leery of these events. We are already planning for next year and solutions to create more privacy for the swans and hopefully another brood.

How does your community feel about being part of the Oregon Restoration Project and contributing to the return of wild trumpeters to the state?

We are very proud to be a part of the Oregon Restoration Project. And particularly now that we have finally seen success in the arrival of this year's cygnets after having adult swans for years. We hope this is just the beginning of many years of being able to contribute to rebuilding wild trumpeters in Oregon.

How do you care for the swans during the year?

Throughout the year we ensure the swans have enough food to supplement what they are able to feed on from our Fazio Lake. We feed a mix of cracked corn and poultry feed formulated for egg health. The cygnets seem to enjoy the supplemental food just as much as the adults do. We monitor our swans daily throughout the year, ensuring they are safe and uninjured. In the winter, this means maintaining ice free water for their safety and security.

You know Trumpeter Watch is important for tracking where swans are during the year. Each report also shares a personal story of seeing a swan in a certain location.

For some people, it is their first time seeing a trumpeter swan. For others, it is the thrilling memory of a moment in time.

Reports are shared with the appropriate state or provincial people tracking swans. It is because of your support of Trumpeter Watch that states and provinces are able to get this important information.

Seeing a trumpeter swan for the first time

Manitoba: We were fishing in a remote area of Manitoba. One of our friends from Ontario was with us.

I heard a honk, and the other two in the boat commented how it must be the trucks on the highway (which is not close). Then the noise got louder and flew just over the water to the side of us and landed on the shore. It was two Trumpeter Swans!

Visiting from Texas, I had no idea what birds they were, but our Ontario friend identified them for us. I was enamored and watched them at the shore, fly across the lake, and just make their happy honking-trumpet noises while they stayed near us, but not too close. What a sight and an enjoyment to watch!

When I returned to my mother-in-law, who had just added a bird app which checked off the birds by their calls, I told her about the Trumpeter Swans and tried to add them into her count. This is when I realized my sighting may be out of the ordinary, when the app wouldn't allow us to add them because it was out of their typical range.

I have been thinking of this for months, and glad I came across your site as I thought more about the amazing Trumpeter Swans.


